Rector Alison's Letter

Thank you for the music

Dear Friends

Who would have thought, 2 years on from that first shutting down of society, that we would still not be 'back to normal'? I am aware that for some, this pandemic is still causing very real difficulties and anxieties. However, a gradual regaining of things that gave us joy has been wonderful. For me, one of the best has been the return of live music and singing.

February and March brought much musical joy: I was able to sing in public with my choir for the first time in two years when we sang evensong in Beverley Minster; I enjoyed an evening with Leeds Festival Chorus; then there was a trip to Manchester to an orchestral concert with my sister.

I had almost forgotten the way music, and live music in particular, can lift us out of our everyday lives, connect us to one another and to something larger. It gives voice to parts of us that can't be expressed through words. So, to all those musicians who have kept groups going online, outside; those who had to put their music on hold; those coming back together now to put on much postponed concerts — 'thank you for the music', it enriches my life enormously.

Perhaps the greatest joy though, has been the simple return of singing to our worship in church. We were definitely a little tentative and rusty, but our organist remarked last week on the joy of having to increase the volume of the organ to match the singing!

Singing has always been part of our faith journey. Hymns chosen for weddings and funerals often speak of a special memory or emotion we wish to share. And our Sunday hymns help us to tell, and experience, the church year in a way words on their own can't quite manage.

At Christmas and Epiphany we sing with awe and wonder of the Christchild come to earth; during Lent the tone is more sombre as our music helps us turn our faces to the cross.

Then we reach Holy Week. On Palm Sunday we sing 'Hosanna' with those who greeted Jesus as King in Jerusalem. On Maundy Thursday we sing more softly of a king who washes feet and shares bread and wine. On Good Friday words seem inadequate – and I for one need the age-old hymns. And all this makes the resounding 'Alleluia' of Easter morning even more shockingly joyful.

I realise that music doesn't affect us all the same, and the Holy Week journey involves words and actions too. Whichever speaks most to you, do come along this Holy Week, and experience the life giving story of God's love for us all.

And I would like to end saying to our wonderful musicians - organists, singers, instrumentalists - who add so much to our worship week by week, 'Thank you for the music'.

York Gate on Palm Sunday


(10th April 2022)

A Green Legacy

Hello.

A Churchyard through Time, Part 5

In the B section of Adel Churchyard, near the Stables, you will find the grave of **Donald Kaberry** and his wife, Peggy, who lived at Adel Willows.



His grave (with a white rose) is on the 4th row. & in line with the N end Stables wall.

Sir Donald Kaberry (1907-1991) had attended Leeds Grammar School. became a solicitor and Leeds Councillor. He fought with the Royal Artillery in WW2 and was awarded the Military Cross. He was Conservative MP for Leeds NW from 1950-1983. I first met him in 1965, at a residents' meeting.

On his retirement, in 1983, he became Baron Kaberry of Adel cum Eccup. His Coat of Arms featured a Weeping Willow Tree. His home. Adel Willows, had been built in 1860-61 on the site of the former Damstone Farm, for the Eddison family. Frank Davison's grandfather had worked on the building of Adel Willows (see Adel Bells March 2022).

Part of the old farm buildings and the cellars remain on the site: also the old 'Gardener's 4-bedroomed Cottage (with I acre garden).

Adel Willows stands on Old Damstone Lane which was a private track, leading down to Adel Dam. The Eddison family (who also owned Adel Mill and Adel Dam) created a pleasure garden at Adel Dam (and planted rhododendrons round the lake).

The lake at Adel Dam was used by the Eddisons for picnics and fishing in summer and skating in winter.

Adel Willows overlooked gardens, edged with a Ha-ha, then across farm fields to Adel Church. Here, the ancient footpath leads you to St John's main gate on Church Lane.

When the Eddisons moved out, the socialist and fighter for Women's Rights, Isabella Ormston Ford (1855- section C of Adel Churchyard. 1924) and her sister, Emily, moved into Adel Willows. Frank Davison writes about how he built a greenhouse for the sisters at Adel Willows, Isabella & Emily Ford are buried in the **Quaker** Burial Ground on Adel Lane.

The late Michael Hopper and his wife Anne, used to live at Adel Willows (next to the main house). Michael wrote (in Adel Bells) about the wildlife, coming across the farm fields and sometimes visiting their gardenincluding Woodpeckers, Roe Deer, Foxes, Pheasants and Partridge.



The church is linked by the medieval 'Corpse Way' public footpath through the churchyard, which then crosses Church Lane from the main church gate, via a stone stile. It continues now, across a building site, to Otley Road.

The Eddison family who built Adel Willows are buried in the North Edwin's son, Robert William Eddison (1835-1900), was a well-known farmer, engineer, and church warden. He is remembered in this window. It shows **Tubal Cain**, the first metal worker in the Bible. Next time you are in Adel Church, have a close look at the lower section of the central small window on the South wall of the Nave and read the last line:

'Blessed are the Peacemakers'—to be remembered especially in these troubled times...

King David, who wrote many of the Psalms, often had periods of selfdoubt and struggled with many aspects of his life, even his faith. Psalms 31, 32 & 34 are very helpful when we feel dejected and rejected.

In Psalm 31 David is confiding in God about his troubles and then he remembers his faith and trust. In verse 24, he tells us: "Be of good courage, and He shall strengthen your heart, all you who hope in the Lord." In Psalm 32 he rejoices in God's forgiveness and presence in his life. Psalm 34 shows how his faith, prayer, and communion with God helped to get his life back into perspective.

Have a read – and I hope that if you are down, it makes you feel better.

Nature Notes

I was thinking about April being the main month for the return of migrant birds to the UK and it occurred to me that several of them are now very rarely seen here. One that immediately comes to mind is the Cuckoo which is hardly ever heard now in Leeds and is quite scarce over much of England. It was at one time a bird that everybody could identify from its call, but probably not from its appearance. The Cuckoo is long gone from these parts, but a more recent loss has been the Spotted Flycatcher, which used not to arrive until early May and nested in several places in the Meanwood Valley, perhaps including the Churchyard which looks ideal for this little bird. The last one I saw was in a churchyard at Bamburgh in Northumberland.

Warblers are small songbirds, not generally very well-known because they seldom visit gardens and are unobtrusive in their natural habitat; as the name suggests song is their main feature. The Willow Warbler, the commonest summer visitor, sings a descending scale with a trill at the end and as far as I know is still plentiful. Its close relative the Chiffchaff, never quite so numerous, which definitely does occur in the churchyard, sings its name quite monotonously and is probably the best-known bird call in the absence of the Cuckoo. The third warbler of this group is the Wood Warbler which has a distinctive song.

They used to breed in Adel Woods, but if I wanted to hear one today I would visit Bolton Abbey Woods

The Blackcap, another warbler, is still quite common, but the Garden Warbler, its close relative, is now quite scarce, perhaps hanging on in a few places, like another member of this group, the Whitethroat, which at one time was a common nester in roadside hedges, but that got too dangerous with the increase in traffic and it now nests in rough hedges and similar thickets. The Turtle Dove is another summer visitor that now never seems to visit this area — in fact it is in some danger of extinction nationally.

Swallows, House Martins and Swifts rely on insects and we know that there has been a tremendous loss of insects here in recent years. These birds will be returning in April and into May and we will then discover whether enough left here last Autumn and have survived over the winter to maintain a normal population.

The sad thing is that these birds, and many others that are now missing or scarce, live in our fields and hedgerows, in and around our woodlands – what have we done that makes survival so problematical for our wildlife?

World Day of Prayer

Apologies if you set out to go to the World Day of Prayer service at St Chad's last month. Unfortunately, it was cancelled at the last moment and there was nothing we could do to get that information to you. Perhaps reading about the service will help fill the gap.

I know the plans I have for you

The service was celebrated all over the world in seven regions and was prepared by people from England, Wales and Northern Ireland. A passage from Jeremiah about the situation of the exiled people of Israel led them to realise that even in our own country there are different forms of 'exile', through poverty, fear and isolation. Like the people of Jeremiah's time, many, who have settled in the British Isles after having fled their homeland and culture, find themselves in a place where they do not want to be.

'For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope.'
Jeremiah 29 v I I

Three true stories were told at the service, the stories of three British women who found themselves living in difficult situations—in 'exile' due to poverty, fear and isolation. They all showed how God's plans for them had blessed them in very unexpected ways.

Here is Lina's story:-

'My name is Lina and I have helped my son to bring up my four grandsons after their mother left them. My son struggles with mental health issues and cannot work, so there is very little money for even their basic needs. I used to go without food myself in order to buy food for him and the boys.

Five years ago, my grandsons attended an event at my local church, where they were welcomed warmly. Since then, this church has become our wider family. They help us with regular donations of food from the Foodbank and have helped us with clothing and holidays for the family. One member of the congregation is a retired teacher and helped the grandchildren with their homework on a Wednesday night. Through the love of this church, we have sound a safe space, people who love us and will not let us down. I thank God for the way that he has worked out his plans to bless us, to give us hope and a future, through my local church.'

As candles were lit, prayers were said, such as this one:-

God, our Mother and our Father, We light a candle of hope To celebrate with all your people As we watch for your plans and promises to be fulfilled. Amen

A fter one of the wettest Februarys I can remember, following smartly on from one of the driest Januarys, it would be nice if the promise and anticipation brought by April can be turned to action and productivity. There is ever more daylight in the evenings, the sunshine has some warmth in it when it shows itself and your garden is coming to life. Whether it is in the vegetable plot or in the flower borders, it is so much easier to tackle small emerging weeds rather than the more established ones. and it gets you close to the soil to check on its health and fertility. You may also want to resume the mowing of your lawn by the end of the month. Start with a relatively high blade setting and lower it with successive cuts.

If you have perennials in your garden

you will know from experience that some are prone to collapse in wind or rain. Now is the time to be getting your supports in place for these plants. They should be growing away and easily visible, but not yet too large. Plants such as peonies, Knautia and delphiniums, penstemons, sedums and globe thistles amongst many others will flower much more attractively if helped to stay upright.

Woodland flowers take centre stage in April, together with their garden cousins. They are making the most of the spring sunshine before the canopy fills in, so enjoy the anemones, primroses and the smell of wild garlic. By the end of the month it will be time to remove any faded daffodil flowers and some early tulip flowers, nipping off heads and the developing seed pods at the same time, but leaving the green leaves.





Words from Joyce Hill

Dietrich Bonhoeffer

he Common Worship Calendar commemorates the death of Dietrich Bonhoeffer on 9 April, providing 'Lutheran Pastor, Martyr, 1945' as additional information. He was hanged by the Nazis at Flossenbürg concentration camp, accused of association with the 20th July Plot on Hitler's life. As he was led away, he said to a fellow-prisoner, 'This is the end — for me, the beginning of life'. Bonhoeffer was born in 1906 and was ordained into the Lutheran church in November 1931. He was a determined opponent of the Nazis from the time of the election campaign of 1933, which led to Hitler becoming Chancellor.

He fought hard against Hitler's euthanasia programme and the persecution and genocide of the Jews and was one of the notable church leaders who resisted Hitler's attempt to create a Nazified German Protestant Church. This involved the dismissal of pastors and other officials who were of Jewish descent, and even the removal of the Old Testament from the Bible. The Christian opposition issued various declarations against this, asserting the Bible's integrity, God's fidelity to the Jews as his chosen people, and the power of baptism, regardless of racial or ethnic descent. One of the earliest of these declarations was the Bethel

Confession of 1933, which Bonhoeffer played a leading part in drafting. But it was then watered down, and Bonhoeffer refused to sign it.

He felt unable to accept a parish post in Berlin offered to him that autumn. and instead decided to withdraw by taking a two-year post as pastor of two German-speaking Protestant churches in London. Further oppositional declarations were issued in Germany, most notably the Barmen Declaration in 1934, and so, when Bonhoeffer's appointment in London ended, he returned to Germany and became a leading figure in what had by then evolved into being the Confessing Church, the name given to those who resisted the Nazi distortion.

Bonhoeffer had started his ecclesiastical career as a high-flying academic, beginning with studies in the renowned theological faculty in Tübingen. He went on to gain a doctorate in Berlin, followed by further postgraduate work and a teaching fellowship at the Union Theological Seminary in New York. Now, in support of the Confessing Church, he travelled around eastern Germany running underground seminaries.

He was pursued by the Nazis, who closed successive seminaries and banned him from Berlin. In February

1938 Bonhoeffer made initial contact with the members of the German Resistance when his brother-in-law, Hans von Dohnányi (father of the celebrated musical conductor) introduced him to a group in Military Intelligence who were seeking Hitler's overthrow.

In June 1939, however, Bonhoeffer accepted an invitation to return to the Union Theological Seminary in New York — a move he instantly regretted because of what was happening in Germany, and so he returned home only two weeks later. He had to report regularly to the police and was forbidden to publish anything or speak in public, but under the pretext of working for Military Intelligence, he

travelled extensively, using his ecumenical connections abroad to make high-level contact with the Allies. With Dohnány he was also involved in helping German Jews escape to Switzerland. Bonhoeffer and Dohnány were both arrested on 5 April 1943.

Bonhoeffer's practical actions were underpinned by his publications, most notably *The Cost of Discipleship* (on the Sermon on the Mount), *Ethics* (unfinished when he was arrested in 1943), and perhaps best-known of all — his *Letters and Papers from Prison*, which were published after his death.

Tree Maintenance

Councillors in the north of the city are concerned about the impact of overgrown trees that block out light and provide excessive shade, making properties colder and thus more expensive to heat. It is also having a detrimental effect on people's mental health.

Forestry categorise jobs based on inspections and risk assessments, and a category and timescale is allocated. The Scrutiny Board considered whether this policy should be reviewed in the light of how an overgrown tree, whilst it may be healthy, is causing anxiety and illness.

Scrutiny Board has a common law duty to maintain trees and have a strategy for all the trees they are responsible for. It was requested that whole streets are assessed where concern is raised about the safety or shade implications of legacy woodland that is now close to homes to ensure consistency of advice.

It is important to protect trees from developers as long-established trees are a major source of carbon capture. However, where trees are making people's lives a misery because the Council has failed to protect residents by not having an overall management plan for the trees, they are

responsible for those too near to properties.

Footpath/Pathways Maintenance Plans

I know we are hopefully past any winter weather issues but I am often asked about the Council's Winter Maintenance Plans and priorities for which footways and pathways are cleared.

Route plans and footway lists have been established for various categories of footway.

Category Ia: prestige areas with exceptionally high usage in the city centre - pedestrian precinct.
Category I: busy town and district shopping centres and areas where main pedestrian routes link different transport types such as rail and bus. Secondary routes: zones near large schools and industrial areas.
Category 3: link footways through urban areas and busy rural footways, Category 4: low usage estate roads and cul-de-sacs.

Hello everyone. Here are the local issues that are preoccupying us at the moment.

Traffic Lights on the A660

I am having the intervals in traffic light changes on the A660 from Farrar Lane through to the lights controlling traffic at the new roadworks near the Lawnswood Arms checked. There have been constant issues with sensors affecting what should have been a new linked sequence between Farrar Lane, the pedestrian crossing near Cooplands Bakery and Holt Lane. The roadworks have exacerbated the problem along this stretch. The halt line on the Bramhope side of Holt Lane junction directly outside the Lawnswood Arms is set some way back from the junction and I regularly witnessed vehicles still coming south on the A660, apparently well after their lights have changed to red, while traffic is exiting Holt Lane on green. This has been referred to highways officers.

Adel Beck Development

This planning application which seems to have been around for donkeys' years is still sitting in the pending consideration tray at the Civic Hall. There have been numerous delays surrounding this application,

mainly concerned with the design, an objection of English Heritage, highway matters and the housing mix. These have taken some considerable time to resolve, and the application has consequently gone through various amendments. It's a reminder, if one was needed, that getting alterations to listed buildings past English Heritage is easier said than done, even when said buildings are falling down and a danger to the public.

Revised site plans addressing most of the issues above and more recently, amending the housing mix have now been submitted. It's anticipated that planning approval will be granted in the next 2 months, following the completion of a \$106 agreement. The applicant will then have 3 years to implement the consent. I understand that the developer is eager to start work, so I would expect this will happen soon after consent is issued, assuming contractors are available. One added advantage of this, is that we will, at long last, have a children's play area in Adel, albeit not exactly central.




