RECTOR ALISON'S LETTER

If someone asked you 'when does the year begin?' most of you would probably say January Ist. If, like me, you have worked in schools, you might feel the year begins in September. For the church though, the year begins on Advent Sunday, which this year falls on November 30th.

This means we start our year with a time of anticipation and preparation. The word 'Advent' means coming. During advent we prepare for the coming of Christ. But this is a very different preparation to the rush of shopping, cooking, practising plays and carols, attending Christmas parties and all the other things we try to fit in before December 25th.

Advent in the church is a much quieter affair. It can slip by unnoticed, since what we appear to do is light candles, and wait!

The candles are on our advent wreath, a tradition which originated in the German Lutheran church in 1839. The children in a mission school would ask daily, and impatiently, if Christmas had arrived, so the minister decorated a cart wheel with 24 small red candles and 4 large white ones. They lit a red candle daily, and a large white one each Sunday and could see the approach of Christmas. Modern day Advent calendars perhaps fulfill a similar purpose.

Church advent wreaths are now reduced to four Sunday candles with an extra for Christmas morning, but the time they measure is far more than a lesson in patience. For Christians it is an acknowledgement that our lives might need a bit of preparation before we welcome the Christ child.

There are various suggestions as to what each candle might signify. They can be for the Patriarchs, Prophets, John the Baptist and Mary. This means we think about those who prepared for Christ's coming from the Old Testament onwards. Alternatively, they are labelled hope, peace, joy and love, as we think about how we should anticipate the coming of Jesus.

What really matters is that we find some space amongst the physical preparation to be still, pray and think. I need Advent. I need the chance to ponder God's love for us, shown in his coming as a vulnerable human baby, and how my life might reflect that love. Whatever Christmas means to each of us, it is no bad thing to make time to take stock not just of our store cupboards, but also our lives; to find a bit of stillness in the busyness of life.

We love welcoming many from our community to our Christmas services...from the quiet of our 'Blue Christmas', via the joy of Crib

services to the awe and wonder of Midnight Mass. But if you have never thought about Advent, beyond its Advent Calendars, you might like to join us as we make time to stop and think. Everyone is welcome.

However you observe Advent and celebrate Christmas, I pray that you will know the love of God and the peace of the Christ child in your homes and lives.



REV'D IAN REFLECTS

The benefits of faith

"I've got a lot of faith. It's all I've got."

This is another quotation from my holiday reading, this time from the novel *The Mandelbaum Gate* by Muriel Spark, the character speaking for Spark herself. Spark was a convert to Catholicism. Brought up in Presbyterian Edinburgh (thus *The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie*), she found in faith meaning in the world around her.

This is one benefit of our faith that we perhaps do not highlight enough. Coming to faith is to discover how to make sense of the world. Our faith provides a coherent way of seeing the world. I have a friend and we talk each week. Recently he said to me, "Given the state of the world, if I didn't have faith I think I should despair." Not that there aren't many things we don't understand, but we have a framework of understanding and a trust in that understanding based on our trust in God.

There are so many benefits from faith. To mention a few more. Faith also gives us an understanding of ourselves and our place in the world. We are transformed for the better by faith. This isn't surprising when we come to see that love is what we seek to be the basis of all relationships. Coming to faith means living a life committed to loving one another, responding to

Jesus' command that we love one another as he loved us.

Other benefits include being embraced by a loving community, something that sustains us and builds harmony. Of course, we cannot kid ourselves that this means that life will be plain sailing, far from it. But another significant benefit is the comfort we receive in difficult times; my friend found not just understanding but comfort.

In times when people find it difficult to make sense of the world and struggle with understanding themselves, these benefits can be transformative. When asked in a survey what initiated people's journey of faith, 37% of participants said it was because they wanted help with life, 34% were searching for meaning.

I believe we should speak more about this. We don't believe because of the truth of our faith or because of the benefits but because it is true. But these benefits are hugely lifeenhancing and attractive. Speaking about them can be a way of attracting people towards that truth and to knowing Jesus.

25th December, 336

British and German soldiers met in no man's land; they exchanged gifts, took photographs, and played impromptu football games. Both sides also took time to bury casualties and repair trenches. The truce wasn't observed everywhere along the Western Front. After Boxing Day, the friendly meetings in no man's land ended and the war continued.



Recently Revd Ian Johnston reminded us that we all have talents and it is up to us to use ours for the good of others. I interviewed Sue Pagdin as we at church have often benefitted from her many talents. You probably know her as a painter, and this year's Church Christmas card carries an example of her work, but It seems she can stretch her hand to anything. I think we can all learn something from her example.

What was the first useful thing you did? I have to say, it was learning to sew. I guess I must have started to sew when I was about II. I made my school uniform, with the help of my mother, I'm sure. It was a tunic. I remember too at school being given a square of material and we had to make an apron out of it. Mine was yellow and I wore it for all my cookery classes. Later in life I used to make clothes for all the family. I would go to Chesterfield market to buy material and found that I could make lovely dresses for my daughters at a cost of only 20p each. They didn't always think they were lovely. I even made trousers for my husband.

What was your most ambitious task? My most ambitious task which my mother thought foolish of me to even consider was to upholster my three-piece suite! 21 yards of material. It took me quite a while. It was a big thing to take on but my children were

at school so I had the time. I taught myself. I used the material that I took off as a template. I've always made things ever since. I see it as a challenge. I just have a go.

Did your daughters always appreciate what you made for them?
Perhaps not when they were little, but I'm sure they appreciated the wedding dresses I made for them. The dress my elder daughter wanted in 1989 was too expensive to buy. It cost me £400 to make it. It was very scary making that first cut in the silk and then in the beautiful lace You can imagine how nervous I was.

Did you use patterns? In the beginning I did, but I remember an occasion a couple of years ago when I decided to cut up some skirts that were too long for me and using an old blouse as a template I created some new blouses. I don't like to waste anything. I'm a have a go girl, really.

Would you literally have a go at anything? I remember a washing machine that broke down and I was determined to see if I could mend it myself. I couldn't afford to pay people to do jobs, so I turned it upside down, removed the

motor and went down to Reagan's in Leeds and bought a new motor. I fitted it and it worked. That was a real yippee job!

But sewing isn't by far your only talent, you also bake and decorate cakes, as we have discovered in church.

I started when my granddaughter wanted a birthday cake. She wanted a spider and a spider's web with sweets in it. So I put a spider on top of he cake, together with sweets, and since it was close to Valentine's Day I gave the spider a heart-shaped mouth. "Grandma, it's just what I wanted" were her words when she saw the finished result. So that was how I started. I made a wedding cake for a

friend, three square cakes set at an angle on top of each other. I put models of the bride and groom on top, replicating exactly what they would be wearing at the wedding. I put helmets on them as the wedding took place in a slate mine in Wales. The top of the helmets came off and I put light bulbs inside them as a surprise for them. What message would you like to give people?

You can have a go because you never know what you can achieve until you try. I like to have something to aim for and if I manage to do it, I get a great deal of satisfaction. If I can do it anybody can do it.

A PASTOR OF HIGH DISTINCTION

We said goodbye to Revd Robert Way in November. Read what several members of our congregation remember about him.

A personal remembrance

My earliest memory of Robert was at my very first Evensong in Adel when I came here as Curate. The text I had to preach on was from Isaiah, about which, to be honest, I knew not a great deal at the time. And the one thing I had been told about Robert was that he was an Old Testament scholar, conversant with the original Hebrew.

And there was Robert in the congregation. He was looking at me, no, smiling at me, and expectantly listening to what I had to say. Now, I was used to public speaking but not where the audience knew so much more about the subject than I did. Yet Robert was thoughtful and generous in his response. I chose the same reading for his funeral as my way of giving thanks for who Robert was for me.

Robert was someone who shared his learning freely. I was to come across members of another congregation where I worked who were keen to hear about him as he had taught them Hebrew.

Robert also had a deep engagement with Orthodox Jewish understanding

of the Hebrew scriptures. Again, when I was a Curate, each Advent I was able to join a seminar he organised at St Columba United Reform Church, where he had been a Minister. He invited the Rabbi of the Orthodox Synagogue to share with us his reading of the prophets we would be reading during Advent. It was always illuminating and expanded everyone's engagement with scripture.

Robert told me that as a URC Minister, he had held evangelical services he thought preferable to Anglican liturgy! Until, on retirement, he came to worship at Adel and grew to appreciate that, every week, our liturgy ensures we say to God what we need to say to him.

I preached many times with Robert in the congregation and we had many thoughtful conversations as a result. I believe he saw in me someone he wanted to nurture. In later years I was to miss this relationship, but I took from him his generous attitude and his respect for Jewish readings of our shared scriptures.

Robert was someone whose love of and trust in God never wavered, whatever the circumstances; he was someone in whom the light of Christ clearly shone - he was in this an example to us all.

Robert was one of my dearest and closest friends. On daily walks I often called in at his house and on numerous occasions he and Stella came to celebrations at my home, after which Robert thanked me in the form of a beautiful handwritten letter he posted through my mailbox; several of these I have retained since their thoughtful content is remarkable, He wrote, for example, 'As for my debt to you for your company, your endless good humour and for your friendship, that is not a debt which can be settled' and 'I may be a Minister, but for you our house is declared a Proverbs (25:17) free zone', and when I was undergoing cancer treatment, 'So May it be that these coming uncertain weeks give you new insight into life and living and loving, and the added years in which to enjoy what you discover.'

When Robert moved into a Care Home, I lost all these valuable connections, but he was warmly remembered in my thoughts and prayers, and whenever I saw Stella.

Robert was such a quiet, caring clergyman - it was a great surprise, when Adel folk gave a fund-raising concert (on a dark evening) in Church - and Robert gave a very loud and lively performance of Lewis Caroll's 'Jabberwocky' - which was quite scary!

There was something ascetic about him, saintly even; a notion which the man himself would have dismissed. No one who met Robert Way could fail to be impressed by his kindness, accessibility, unfeigned interest in others and anxiety to help. Those qualities made him a pastor of high distinction. But there was more to it than that. The sermons which he would sometimes deliver at Evensong in our church reflected profound faith, deep learning lightly worn, a capacity to waylay the unexpected word or phrase, an ability to light upon telling connections of place or thought. Almost more remarkable, his hearers knew by instinct that he had devoted the same care to the preparation and delivery of these addresses, for a congregation of twenty, as he would have done for an assembly of two hundred or indeed two thousand: in sum, that he was conferring on us a privilege to be treasured.

WORDS FROM JOYCE HILL

The Feast of Stephen

The title of this month's article, as I'm sure everyone will recognise, is from the opening of a popular Christmas carol: Good King Wenceslas looked out on the Feast of Stephen. Wenceslas was Prince and Duke of Bohemia from 931 to probably 935, when he was assassinated by his younger brother. Almost immediately he was held up as a heroic ruler of great virtue, whose death was regarded as a martyrdom. The story familiar to us captures his determination, piety, kindness and generosity. It has its origins in the words of the chronicler Cosmas of Prague who, in c. 1119, wrote, 'no one doubts that, rising every night from this noble bed, with bare feet and only one chamberlain, he went around to God's churches and gave alms generously to widows, orphans, those in prison and afflicted by every difficulty, so much so that he was considered, not a prince, but the father of all the wretched'. The words of the carol were published by an American, John Mason Neale, in 1853. It's wholly imaginative, but its vivid details capture the essence of Wenceslas's virtue as a ruler, for which he is venerated in the Czech Republic.


Mason's poem presents a scene that takes place in the depths of winter, 'on the feast of Stephen', celebrated on 26 December. Stephen is the

church's protomartyr, or first martyr (Greek π ρ $\tilde{\omega}$ τος, pr \acute{o} tos, 'first'). Our only information about him is in the Acts of the Apostles, chapters 6-8. There we learn that Hellenistic (Greek-speaking) lews who were following the new teachings of Christ began to grumble that the widows of their community were doing less well from the daily distribution of food than those of the Hebraic Jews. So the twelve Apostles proposed that the growing number of those who were busy with this distribution should appoint seven men 'full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom' who could be relied upon to oversee fair distribution. Stephen was one of these: his Greek name suggests that he was himself a member of the Hellenistic community. The seven were then blessed by the Apostles in an act that later came to be understood as ordaining them as deacons, and so they began their work. Stephen is singled out as being a miracle-worker, full of faith and inspired by the Holy Spirit. But there were members of certain synagogues who challenged Stephen's new Christian teaching. When it proved impossible to defeat him in debate, they orchestrated more hostility against him, made use of false testimony, and had him seized and brought before the Sanhedrin on a charge of blasphemy against Moses. Most of Acts chapter 7 is taken up

with Stephen's defence, strongly supporting the ministry of Jesus as a fulfilment of Jewish history and teaching, not a destruction of it. He concludes with a rousing condemnation of the Jews for resisting the Holy Spirit in a manner he describes as 'stiff-necked'. This angered the crowd even more, and so they took him outside the city and stoned him to death, with Stephen committing himself to God as he died,

and begging God to forgive them for what they were doing. A young man, by the name of Saul, stood and watched, looking after the cloaks of those doing the stoning. At the time, he was a vigorous persecutor of those who followed the new faith. But he later underwent a dramatic conversion and, as Paul, became one of the great leaders of the early church.







ADEL SCHOOLS HISTORY



Adel St John the Baptist C of E Primary School, Long Causeway

The Stone Melon Hog, in the playground, was carved in 1977, from an old stone gatepost, by Denis Mason Jones, the school architect. The 1875 Carved Stone Acorn (on the right) was ghost haunts Leeds Library. once the headpiece on the gable of a mill on Whitehall Road, Leeds.

Adel School records go back to 1625. In 1792, a new School House was built on the corner of Holt Lane and Otley Road. By 1833, 75 pupils (boys & girls) were attending Adel School. This school site is now M & S.

In the 1870s, Adel School needed replacing and a new School and Headmaster's House was built on Church Lane.

It opened in October 1875. The Church Lane School is now private housing and part of Adel Conservation Area.

Headmaster (WWI Soldier & Postcard artist,) Mr Sternberg is remembered by older people in Adel Parish. He died in

1954. He is buried in Adel Churchyard, close to the seat round the old tree stump, in the grave of his grandfather, Vincent Thomas Sternberg, whose

In 1992, a second Primary School was needed in Adel.

Adel Primary School was built on Tile Lane.

ow is the time to enjoy the glories of the imagined garden – those you remember, those you like and those you might have. So sit back and let the weather do what it will, whilst you recall all the treasures from the last year, all the gaps that need filling and remember the plants that may have succumbed during the year and the opportunities these now provide. Then there is the leisurely deliberation, aided by mulled wine and mince pies, over what to do about it all! Take your time. It could be weeks before you get out again!

The internet is now full of places to view plants, planting schemes, plug plants, seeds and spring and summer bulbs and places to buy them, so in that sense it has never been easier to get hold of whatever it is you would like. Seed and plant catalogues also abound. Reputable suppliers will always give you advice on when and where to plant your choices. It might be an opportunity to suggest to any family or friends who enquire about suitable Christmas presents to have a list ready!

If you really want to get out into your garden then how about putting out


food for the birds? With such short days our birds need to take advantage of all the available daylight to feed as efficiently as they can. As our winter progresses their natural food supplies diminish so any supplements will be gratefully and greedily received. After an awesome fruiting year in the hedgerows keep your eyes open for those regular winter visitors from Scandinavia, the redwing and the fieldfare, and if we are very lucky a few waxwings may join the party. Equally fascinating are the hordes of blackbirds, robins and goldcrests that also travel across from the continent to supplement our resident populations, exploiting the food supplies and warmer weather they would otherwise have to endure.

I always give my greenhouse a proper clear out at this time of year, followed by a thorough wash with warm soapy water to get the glass nice and clean again, ready to let maximum light through. Most years I will also dig in a few wheelbarrows full of well-rotted compost from my compost heaps to keep the soil as fertile as possible. There is a special pleasure in working in the greenhouse on a foul day, pottering about whilst listening to the rain pelting the glass, and its always a little bit warmer in there!



PLAY REVIEW

Adel Players' recent production 'The Incident Room' will have awoken strong memories of the murders carried out by Peter Sutcliffe, otherwise known as the Yorkshire Ripper. Theories as to who he was and how he did the murders without being seen, led people to question themselves, could it be someone they knew: a neighbour, a friend, that creepy man in the next street... no woman felt safe.

There were urban myths flying around of people giving lifts to old ladies who were found to have hairy hands and a hammer in their handbag, and others, more plausible, of being spoken to by a man who sent cold shivers down their spine. But all the time, the police had mounted a huge investigation, yet they seemed to be constantly barking up the wrong tree.

This play was centred round the Incident Room at the now demolished Millgarth Police station in central Leeds. The frustrations of those involved in the investigation, were conveyed wonderfully by the whole cast, displaying the attitude of men to women in the workplace, as when the head of Manchester CID swept in, and as he was introduced to Sgt Megan Winterburn, barked out his order for a cup of tea "with three sugars!". She to her credit answered "The kettle's over there!" That captured the feeling of that era, women made the tea, men

solved the crimes.

As the play evolved, we heard the so-called "Ripper Tapes", still guaranteed to shock nearly fifty years on. We heard the letters supposedly sent by the Ripper, red herrings which delayed the investigation greatly, and all the time we felt the frustration of Megan Winterburn and Andy Laptew, as they could see a different side to it, which was brushed aside by the senior officers. And all the time the boxes of files piled up, threatening to take over the office. There was quite a bit of humour too; laughter rang out loud several times during the play.

Every single member of the cast played their parts to perfection, you could really believe in them, but especial mention must be made to Dianne Newby, as she portrayed both Sylvia Swinson and Maureen Long to perfection. The play was fast paced, with excellent lighting changes which added to the dramatic impact, and they made great use of technology with the screens showing footage from news reels of the time. The backdrop and lighting enhanced what was already an amazing drama. Congratulations to all the cast and crew, it was a very slick and professional performance.

Sybil Spencer grew the Chilean bellflower, Lapageria rosea, in her greenhouse and now, perhaps as a nod to this beautiful plant, there is a magnificent Chilean lantern tree Crinodendron hookerianum growing against the wall at the entrance to the greenhouse. With its abundance of red lanterns, vivid against a clear blue

sky, it was one of my breathtaking moments in the garden this summer.

Reflecting on the past year in the garden, there are so many memories of leisurely afternoons in the sunshine, watching the changing of the seasons and admiring the work of the garden team. Already there are plans afoot for next year – a garden never stands still.

As the bell-ringers and carol singers herald the coming of Christmas and children eagerly await the sound of Santa's sleigh bells, everyone is preparing for the festivities and looking forward to sharing time with family and friends to celebrate the birth of Christ. In an attempt to give a voice to local groups, I contacted Francis Garbutt to ask about the sheltered housing at Wayland Croft, as many of our readers may not be aware of it. Francis has informed me that it is now known as 'Retirement LIFE.' This is what he had to say about it. Marjorie

There are 24 one-bedroom flats designed for older residents who need some support to live independently. Retirement LIFE offers independent living options for those aged 60 and over, with support tailored to individual daily needs. It may also be suitable for individuals under 60 who would benefit from additional support. A team of dedicated Support Officers visits residents up to five times per week, Monday to Friday, depending on each resident's preference. They provide advice and can make referrals for further assistance if needed. Each property has a support charge that allows residents the use of the lounge, kitchen, laundry facilities, and more. Anyone wishing to join this scheme must register with Leeds Homes and complete a social housing application on their website: www.leedshomes.org.uk. Retirement LIFE offers residents a vibrant social life, making it easy to meet people and stay connected. Residents organise activities twice weekly: every Monday (except bank holidays) there is a coffee morning from 10:00 am to 12:00 noon. Every Thursday at 7:00 pm, residents

host bingo sessions.

Residents at Wayland Croft would gladly welcome others from the nearby community to join them on Mondays for a chat and a coffee, tea, or even breakfast. If you prefer a game of bingo on Thursdays, feel free to come along and play a few games. For some activities, a small contribution may be requested to cover costs.

De-Leafing Programme

De-Leafing work began on 27th October. Cleaner Neighbourhoods' teams will be prioritising de-leafing activities to ensure pathways and public spaces remain safe and accessible.

This year there are 2 leafing teams comprised of 3 mechanical sweepers each supported by staff from contractors Krinkels. Each ward will have a team a minimum of between I to 2 times a week, where the priority will be high foot fall areas such as schools, hospitals, doctors' surgeries, high streets, sheltered housing complexes and areas of high leaf fall. All referrals for leaf sweeping will be allocated to the teams when they are in the ward of the referral. Normal business may be affected while they focus resources on this essential seasonal work.

Leeds Accredited Waste Carriers Scheme

If you need to dispose of unwanted waste of any kind please refer to the Leeds Accredited Waste Carriers Scheme (LAWCS) which helps residents find someone local, legal and responsible to take away their waste. Please also consider giving unwanted stuff a second chance by swapping, selling or donating to charity. Using

unaccredited waste carriers could cost you dearly if they dump your waste illegally and it can be traced back to you.

Abbey House Museum

You may be pleased to know that Leeds Museums and Galleries have been awarded a total of £952,000 following a successful bid to the Museum Renewal Fund. The funding will support a total of ten inspiring projects being planned by the service, including Abbey House Museum, producing a long-term development plan that will work towards safeguarding the museum's future.

Leeds's 400 years celebration plans

Next year Leeds will be marking 400 years since it was awarded its first Royal City Charter on 13th July 1626. Ironically it was King Charles I who granted the city a Royal Charter, incorporating Leeds as a "free borough" and a "body corporate and politic", the first steps towards selfgovernment and city status. The Leeds 400 Strategic Group, including Leeds Civic Trust, Culture Consortium Leeds, Child Friendly Leeds, Leeds BID, and the Chamber of Commerce organisations and communities, will be working together to celebrate through events, performances,

Land at the top of Farrar Lane

The Council is marketing the vacant land at the top of Farrar Lane, inviting offers for its purchase for affordable housing development. The site is ring fenced solely for purchase by Registered Social Housing Providers only for the provision of 100% affordable housing with the option to include affordable housing extra care provision. Any proposal will be required to preserve access to the adjacent High Farm public house and also (with some Council retained car parking provision) to the adjacent

tennis courts to the east of the site. For clarity the land in question is the current car park next to the High Farm pub, the derelict area at the rear of Asda (old Ralph Thoresby school) and the land next to the current sheltered housing complex.

Hi everyone. As this is the final Adel Bells of 2025, I would like to wish everyone a very Merry Christmas and a happy and healthy New Year.

New road safety measures in Adel

Some months ago, you may remember I mentioned that the council highways department had not finalised the road markings on and adjacent to Sir George Martin Drive near East Moor

Drive and the Waylands estate. This is now being addressed via a consultation on the introduction of Traffic Regulation Orders which are the means by which the changes can be legally enforced. They include, at long last, making the bus turnaround point a formal one-way circuit and a two-hour parking limit on a section north of Wayland Approach. It would seem that the plans to turn the section of Holt Lane running past the golf course into a Greenway are ploughing ahead with a prohibition on all vehicles other than cycles applied for and the speed limit reducing to from 40mph to 30mph on the remaining section which will

remain a highway. There are also plans to improve the footpath at the Cookridge Lane end if funding becomes available.

Postal voters

With the next local elections due in May the council is asking residents to urgently renew their postal vote details if they have not yet already done so as the deadline nears. All registered postal voters in the city who applied to vote by that method before 30 January 2024 need to renew their details by the end of January 2026 to avoid having their postal vote option cancelled. More information can be found on the council website but if you are in any doubt about what to do, please contact me.

Ash die back

The gardeners amongst you will be well aware that this is a very serious disease currently affecting many ash trees across the UK. It weakens trees and can lead to safety risks. Leeds City Council is removing severely affected trees from public land, but if residents have ash trees on their property, it is their responsibility to check them and keep them safe. To help residents, the council has created a map showing tree conditions near main roads, and any recommended actions. Once again, please contact me if you have any concerns or wish to know more.

Collection of garden waste

Please note that the final brown bin collection this year will be on 29th November although bear in mind that your last collection may be the previous week depending on the route you are on. The great leaf clean up by the council began on 27 October but the leaves will continue to fall for some weeks yet. As advised previously, the crew will concentrate on major routes first before moving on to secondary routes. If you have any real problematic leaf fall in your area, please let me know.
