Rector Alison's Letter

Dear Friends

As you may know, I started my working life as a scientist, teaching in a high school. My science is a little rusty these days, so it is always a joy to be asked to lead our school Collective Worship for Science Week. It reminds me of what I love about science.

This year we explored the now widely forgotten 'Phlogiston Theory' of what happens when things burn. Put forward in the late 17th century, it suggested materials which burned did so because they contained 'phlogiston'. This was released into the air by burning.

Gradually, evidence was found which didn't fit easily with this theory: if a jar was put over a candle, it went out; metals became heavier when they burned. Some scientists, convinced the theory was right, came up with strange ideas to make it fit the evidence. They suggested air could only contain so much phlogiston, and when it was full, a fire would go out; and that phlogiston weighed *less than nothing...*so when it was given off — things got heavier!

Eventually of course, oxygen was discovered, a better theory of combustion put forward, and phlogiston confined to the history books. It reminded me of two

important points though.

Firstly, scientific theories are just that...the best idea we have at the moment to explain what we see. We might find evidence to support them, but we can never be completely sure they are right, they can only ever be proved wrong.

Secondly, the efforts we will make to protect strongly held beliefs; how difficult we can find it to admit we are wrong and change our minds, even when the evidence tells us so.

I shared this with the children to show how science works and to remind us how important it is to be willing to question ourselves and listen to others...not just in science, but in life.

Today there is enormous choice of sources of news. It is very easy to interact only with people whose opinions are similar to ours. I worry that we are also forgetting how to disagree well, and seeing issues as more and more clear cut.

We can get out of the habit of really listening to opposing views, and being ready to change our minds. Without this challenge, our views and our attempts to prove them right, risk becoming as odd as those ideas about phlogiston.

I have always felt that my science training was a great foundation for theology and life in the church. My experiences give me a firm belief that God loves me, and Jesus' life, death and resurrection bring me closer to God. But how that 'works', how exactly to interpret the bible and what it means for our lives are a bit like scientific theories we work on together as a church family as we meet week by week. Our faith grows by hearing the ideas of others, young and old.

Everyone is welcome to join us, but wherever we encounter friends and strangers, I hope we are all ready to have our minds changed.

Rev'd Ian Reflects

And we shall have cake! It's the Feast of the Ascension!

We all love cake, don't we? And we all have our favourites. Celebratory cakes are among the best. Who doesn't like a nice birthday cake? (No emails, please!)

And for the Church's two great celebrations, Christmas and Easter, we have special cakes, Christmas cake and Simnel cake for Easter - both with their associated traditions. What we don't - in the Anglican tradition - have is a cake associated with the Ascension, the final great Feast of the Liturgical year. Now, this may be because we don't make as much of the Ascension as the other Feasts. It always happens on a Thursday, being 40 days after Easter, which, let's be honest, makes it less easy to celebrate than on a Sunday morning.

This is a shame because it is Jesus' Ascension that completes God's saving work through him in two very important respects.

Jesus ascended into the heavens and sits at the right hand of the Father, forever interceding with God on our behalf, as our great high priest, bringing us forgiveness from the Father. And through the Ascension, Jesus is not only at the right hand of the Father, he is everywhere and gives

us the gift of the Holy Spirit. And St Paul repeatedly tells us that, as believers, Christ is **in** us. And this is a promise that Jesus made, that if we believe in him, he will live in, abide in, us. Such comfort and joy.

Now, in France and many other countries they do have Ascension cakes, so this year we are, like them, going to make more of celebrating Jesus' Ascension. We are going to do so by having a special cake to share at the end of the service (with some fluid refreshment too, nature of which still to be decided at the time of writing.) And big thanks to Trevor, Marjorie and Sue Pagdin for what will no doubt be a splendid, mouthwatering, spiritraising (it is Ascension, after all), celebratory cake. (No jokes about self-raising flour!)

Why are we doing this? First, because the Feast of Ascension is to be celebrated, like Christmas and Easter, it is a Feast of great joy, and second, to encourage as many people as possible to come along and engage with the spirit of generosity and sharing that this Feast inspires.

Part of a Bigger Family

The series of four talks for Lent were really informative and very interesting. They gave us lots to think about as to how other churches work. They can all be viewed on YouTube and are certainly worth watching.

Kay Brown - Chaplain, Abbey Grange C of E Academy

Kay explained to us how she first became a School Chaplain and how involved she is with all the pupils. It is a large school and can at first be rather daunting to many of our young people who go there from our own school. As with all schools there are always lots of challenges, but Kay is happy that she is in a position to help with these. She is able to talk and listen to them on a one to one basis if necessary and to help nurture them in their faith. We also got a real insight into how the school works and how the nurturing follows on from their previous school. She painted a picture of a very happy and caring school.

Rev'd Stephen Hanscombe, vicar of Leyburn and Bellerby

On the way in we picked up a handout sheet with photos and prayers. Stephen told us how different it is to look after a rural and semi-rural parish which is spread over such a large area. He explained

that we are all in the same Diocese but to many it seems like Leeds is a foreign land and that Leyburn is unknown in Leeds. Pastoral ministry can involve lots of time travelling, not that it seemed to phase Rev'd Stephen. Visiting his "flock" is important, especially if they are not able to attend church He explained it can take longer to get to a hospital than to visit Leeds. We had music. poetry and prayers (see page 4).

Rev'd Jon Swales - Mission Priest, Lighthouse Church Leeds

Jon's talk was very different. He explained about "Ministry on the Margins" and that Lighthouse is a Christian community for those in Leeds, battered and bruised by the storms of life. They work together to bring vulnerable adults facing poverty, addictions, mental health problems and homelessness to a better quality of life.

He took us through how they hold their services and we all joined in. Jon said "Jesus said" and we all replied "I am the light of the world". We sang the hymn "Give thanks with a Grateful Heart". Friends from Lighthouse spoke of their journeys and how they had been helped. On the way out I thanked one of them for speaking to us and he said "I did it because of the love I have for Jon" Another couple had

walked all the way from Chapel Allerton to support him at the talk. It certainly gave us plenty to think about on the way home. There was a collection for the work of Lighthouse.

The Very Rev'd Andrew Nunn (formerly Dean of Southwark)

Andrew gave us a very interesting talk on the history of Cathedrals and how they came into being. A Dean is head of the Chapter and is kept very busy. He explained about the choir schools and how things have changed - they have both boys and girls now. He told us about how important pilgrimages

are these days. He said that churches are not always open when needed, whereas Cathedrals are open and can accommodate people to say a prayer or light a candle. He thinks Cathedrals really are the "jewel in the crown" of the Church of England. During his talk he gave us quotes from lots of poets including Malcolm Guite.

The Visitation

31st May is a red-letter day as we celebrate the visit of the Virgin Mary to her cousin Elizabeth, as described only in Luke's gospel, chap. I, vv.39-45. In the preceding verses we hear of Gabriel's visit to Mary, telling her that, through the Holy Spirit, she would give birth to a son, who would be called Jesus, and that her cousin Elizabeth, through the power of God, had conceived a son and was already six months pregnant. Mary immediately sets off to visit Elizabeth who greets her as 'the mother of my Lord'. In response, Mary voices the hymn of praise which we know as the Magnificat.

The Feast of the Visitation was first instituted by the Franciscans in 1263, and just over a century later, Pope Urban VI decided it should be adopted by church as a whole. His successor, Boniface IX, finally proclaimed it in 1389. The date then adopted was 2nd July, which was quite widely used.

At the Reformation, the Church of England's new Book of Common Prayer dropped most of the feast-days of the Roman church. On the reissuing of the BCP in 1662, some of the old feast-days were reintroduced, the Feast of the Visitation being one of them to be celebrated on 2nd July. Celebrating a biblical event, it was an

acceptable feast-day, favoured by the BCP in augmenting its very austere and pared-down calendar. The Roman Catholic calendar was revised in 1969. The Feast of the Visitation was reassigned to 31 May as it harmonised better with the sequence of events in the gospel story. Gabriel had told Mary that Elizabeth was six months pregnant, so the birth of her son — John the Baptist — occurred six months before the birth of Jesus.

After the fourth century, when the feast-day of Jesus's birth came to be celebrated on 25 December, the birth of John was commemorated in the liturgical calendar six months earlier, on 24 June. This meant that, when the feast-day of the Visitation officially entered the calendar on 2 July, this was narratively rather awkward: the Visitation was being celebrated a matter of days after the prominent feast-day of John's birth. So, with the revision of the calendar in 1969, 31 May was chosen instead. It has the merit of preceding the feast-day of John's birth, although why 31 May was the particular date chosen, I have not been able to find out. Perhaps someone can tell me.

The Calendar of Common Worship uses this new date, as do some other churches, but there is a note in Common Worship that the feast may be celebrated on 2 July instead.

Some of us have always recycled. Gardeners have compost heaps or a wormery or both. Mothers recycle children's clothes among friends and relations. Adults take clothes to a charity shop, where someone else makes use of them and the charity receives cash for a good cause. The Oxfam book shop in Headingley is well used by students, particularly for English texts and poetry books (or is that just me?). I am becoming my Mother as I collect paper bags in a drawer in the kitchen as she did many decades ago.

We all try to use the green bins that the council provide. What upset me was that soft plastic could not be put in the green bin - and there is a lot of it. In 2020 the local CO-OP instigated a "Film Recycling Scheme" where all sorts of soft plastic is accepted. Many supermarkets do the same now. So I collected it all in my shopping bag but on my way to the CO-OP much of it "jumped" out of my bag into the foot well of my car and I had to scrabble about to find the lost items under the seat. I decided to design and make my own container for all this soft plastic which would get it to the shop without fuss. It worked. I then made some for neighbours and friends. Then some for the bible study group about 3 years ago. Most people think it is very practical. I

have made about 50 more to sell at the Green Fair at a cost of £3.50 or more. All proceeds are going to the Church.

The fabric came from my sewing group. Two people were getting rid of excess bits and were only too pleased for me to use them. When I showed them what I had done one woman exclaimed "Oh! Look – there are my sitting room curtains!"

One is going in the Stables along with a list of what can go in it. I think you might be surprised by how quickly it fills up.





Editing Adel Bells

I really enjoy being editor of Adel Bells and over the next two months I intend to explain how the magazine is produced. I receive many complimentary comments from readers but I can't take all the praise. Many others contribute towards each month's magazine and I owe a huge debt of gratitude to the former editors who started the process off.

Before Adel Bells first appeared there was a magazine in the early seventies produced jointly by the churches of Adel, Ireland Wood and Tinshill. Then in the late seventies it fell to the Rector of Adel to produce a magazine just for our own parish. Those first magazines were quite different from today's more glossy versions. In 1978, for example, the magazine had only 12 pages and the price was 6p. In those early days Bruce Buchan was editor, a typewriter was used and the magazine was photocopied. When Rector George Darville retired in 2000, Val Crompton took over helped by a team of volunteers. At this time a decision was taken to introduce adverts which would help to pay our costs. It wasn't until 2005 that Val found a professional printer. The result of that was that we could have more pages of interesting articles some of which were about our Adel community whereas the earlier magazines were purely about church related business. Over the years we

have gone from strength to strength and we now usually have 60 pages and a colour picture on the cover.

But let me return to the main question – how is the magazine produced today? With a lot of hard work is the obvious answer. Even as long ago as 1987 the Rector wrote "Adel Bells doesn't write itself." The same can be said today. Although I do the vast majority of the editing and have done for some years, it was Val Crompton who passed the job on to me and Beryl Thompson and gave us a lesson in how to use Publisher, the ideal programme for producing a booklet. There was a lot to learn and for some years Beryl and I produced it together. When Beryl opted out, I carried on and continued to learn about all the clever tricks Publisher can produce.

The difficult question always is to decide what we're going to write about. We are lucky to have several people who write something every month. I approach other people well in advance of the production date to suggest a topic they might like to write on. Fortunately, they mostly respond with a positive reply. Occasionally someone might send me something unexpected that they have written and I am very happy to accept their offer.

In Your Garden

The month of May is named after the Greek Goddess Maia, goddess of nature and growing plants. She was identified in the Roman era as Bona Dea, the goddess of fertility, whose festival was held in May.

May is in many ways the most colourful and striking of months for flowering plants. The bright, still fresh green leaves on the trees, an abundance of blossoms in the canopy and carpets of tulips, late daffodils and all manner of flowering shrubs and plants brighten most gardens now, with long daylight hours during which to appreciate it all, and plenty of warmth in the sunshine to further encourage you out into the garden. Birdsong will peak then mysteriously end when all the territorial disputes are resolved and the private and silent business of raising nestlings takes over. Then towards the end of the month the high-pitched screams of returning swifts will be heard as they barrel around the skies hunting insects on the wing.

You should be able to mow your lawn regularly now, if you so wish. Ideally clippings will go into a compost bin if you have one, mixed with other suitable waste. Keep the lawn edges trimmed to deter the grass from creeping into the border. Applying a high nitrogen summer lawn fertiliser will encourage a healthy-looking lawn. You might like to consider leaving a

patch of lawn uncut for the benefit of the many insects that require long grass to reproduce - especially a good many butterfly species.


May is the time to be planting out your summer bedding, either straight into prepared beds in the garden, or else into your pots or containers. It is a good idea to add slow-release fertilisers to the soil, or some other soil enrichment, to give plants nutrients throughout the summer. Regular but not excessive watering is essential. Very few plants will thrive or survive prolonged water-logging. If you have anything tender to plant out, be cautious with the weather. Frosts are always possible in the first half of the month, a consequence of our raised elevation here in Adel.

After a desperate year for butterflies last year I will be looking out for them throughout this year. I will also be watching out for signs of fledging birds from the occupied nest boxes and concealed nests around the garden. We should get dusk visits from the pipistrelle bats, from the many foxes, perhaps with cubs or baby hedgehogs checking us out, reward for the sensitive planting, provision of cover and open boundaries that allow safe roaming.

York Gate Update

erns are some of the most ancient plants on the planet, with some dating back to the Carboniferous period about 350 million years ago. For me, ferns have always been fascinating: they come in many variations and sizes and I can well understand how 19th century Britain was swept up in Pteridomania or fern fever.

On 12th September 1952 Sybil recorded in her diary that she had spent the day in "an orgy of fern planting" - and she added that some of her ferns had been collected from the wild during a brief stay in Wales, something that is rightly frowned upon nowadays when so much of our flora and fauna is at risk.

The Fern Border was originally located at the base of the wall against which the raised Canal was built. So. Robin moved it to its present site against another dry-stone wall along the path behind the Paved Garden. The bed was built up with peat, something else that is now endangered and we no longer use, together with leaf mould from the garden, and a rockery was formed with pockets into which he replanted Sybil's beloved ferns.

Whenever I visit the garden, I always walk along the Fern Border and in the past few years the gardeners have added some spring flowering plants to

provide seasonal interest while the ferns are sleeping. Today, on the first day of the garden's opening, there were pink and purple Primulas, pretty blue Pulmonarias and the forgetme-not lookalike with the grand name Omphalodes as well as lots of buds of beautiful white dog's tooth violets or Erythroniums to enjoy. Peering down closely amongst them, I could see the unfurling fern fronds that are just beginning to awaken.

On the other side of the Fern Border is the Yew Hedge, planted by Robin as a conventional hedge at the base but with the six iconic pyramids rising from it. Two years ago, the head gardener decided it was necessary to cut it hard back at the base, along with the yew hedging at the entrance to the Herb Garden, in order to regain their original proportions. You may recall that I wrote about this brutal trimming at the time and that I had been assured it would grow back and be even more beautiful - and today I am pleased to see that it is shaping up well and there is now space for even more ferns!

Spring is the season when new life blossoms everywhere, making it an exciting and vibrant time to explore our beautiful garden; we look forward to welcoming you.


The Glebe lands were split between Adel Parish and the new Arthington Parish.

Arthington kept the cricket field, next to Adel Church.


It was later sold to Adel War Memorial Association. This field is still used for playing cricket. (This a correction to P17 in March 2025 Adel Bells.)

Ironman Leeds

The Ironman competition is coming to Leeds. On Sunday 27^{th} July

competitors will undertake a gruelling test. The Ironman website www.ironman.com/races/im-leeds will give you all the details you need, I also have a full slide pack and maps. In summary IRONMAN Leeds is a longdistance triathlon consisting of a 3.8km swim in Roundhay Park lake, a 180km bike ride made up of three loops to the North of Roundhay Park and finally a 42.2km (26.2 miles) marathon. The athletes have 17hrs to complete all three disciplines to achieve the right to call themselves an IRONMAN finisher.

The various parts of the race will in the main be in the north-east of the city but Back Church Lane and Eccup Lane as well as Black Hill Road and Arthington Lane will also be affected.

2,400 athletes can take part and there are no places left. The oldest athlete in the field will be 78 and the youngest 18. The local economy will benefit to the tune of £4million over the event weekend.

Essential Yorkshire Waterwork, Harewood

If you travel regularly on the A61 between Pool/Harrogate and Leeds you may be aware that Yorkshire Water started work on 5th April, continuing until 18th May, to replace

their old water main that runs along the A61 Harrogate Road from the entrance to Harewood House to the Church Lane junction. It is a short stretch of road but temporary traffic signals will be in place to manage traffic. You may want to avoid the area completely.

The teams will be working 7 days a week. Significant delays should be expected – especially during the morning and evening peak hours. Once this is completed, the 2nd phase of Yorkshire Water's main replacement works will begin further south on A61 Harrogate Road from Wike Lane (towards Alwoodley) to Wikefield Farm/Elm Tree Cottages. The dates for this phase are 19th May to 23rd June.

Bus services X84 and 28

I had a meeting with First Bus about the services 28 and X84. As you may be aware, both services are reduced in frequency. In respect of the 28, First Bus put the lack of reliability down to traffic disruption.

As far as the X84 is concerned there is currently no subsidy for this route. The changes made to the X84 was an attempt to get more people on it without having to reduce the frequency (from every 30 minutes). The change to non-express was a disaster and travelling times increased. This was reversed recently and the X84 returned but with a reduced frequency. I am still having meetings with First Bus and the Combined Authority in an attempt to find a way forward that can meet passenger needs.

First Bus survey – or can the bus service be any worse?

I can see your eyes rolling already but pause for just a few minutes, First Bus have launched another public survey of local bus services. This follows a similar survey last year asking for local views about First Bus services in West Yorkshire that received a good level of response and identified key areas for improvement. You will

recall the recent change of mind in First Bus about the X84 service which came after a concerted (and furious) campaign by residents and politicians so these surveys can play an important part in decision making. The number 28, my local service, is possibly one of the worst services in the city for reliability and the way to change things for the better is to make some noise, If you would like to take part in the survey please let me

know and I will send you a link. If you do not make your views known nothing is likely to happen.

Talking about grants, do you need one? - Part 2

I am delighted to say that, following my article last month about grant funding for York Gate Garden to restore the arbour, two other local organisations have approached me about projects they are interested in progressing. Given the parlous state of the crane being used to install the council finances there are no guarantees about how long funding for April, and construction starting such projects may be available. While there is no immediate danger of funding being withdrawn, much better to take advantage now rather than wait and be disappointed. In addition, there are dozens of other funding opportunities available outside of the council covering a multitude of areas. It is surprising how much is available for local organisations. Once again, please let me know if you would like more details.

Temporary Otley Bridge Footpath - to be or not to be? Definitely to be!

You will all have seen the furore over recent months on local media from the Green lobby and others about the damage to the environment caused by installation of the temporary footbridge. Whatever your views about the project, it is a quite remarkable piece of engineering. It is

very similar to Bailey Bridge construction in WW2 with preconstructed sections delivered to the site and literally pushed across the river. but obviously modernised and mechanised. Vehicle and pedestrian passage will continue with minimum disruption although the road bridge will have brief closures overnight when the last part of the old footbridge is removed and the new permanent footbridge put in place. The timetable is remarkably rapid with temporary footbridge arriving on 8 immediately. The temporary footbridge opening is planned for June, with the existing footbridge removed and replaced from June to October, and the temporary footbridge removed in October. It is an interesting piece of engineering and if you would like to know about the project including a video, please let me know.
