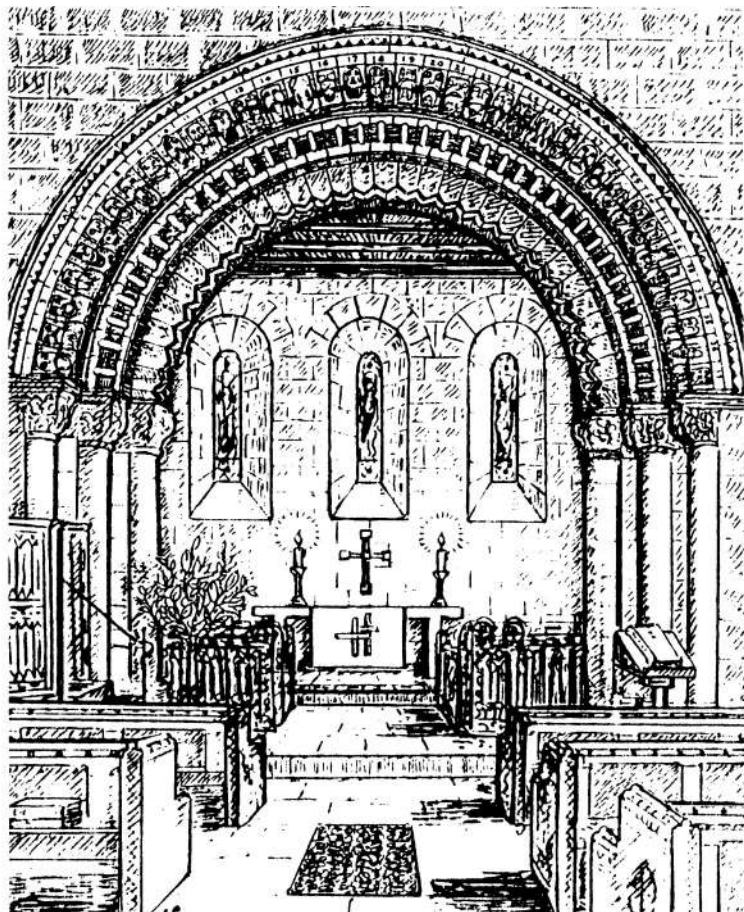

Rector Alison's Letter

I am not a great watcher of sport on television, but I do love athletics. This has been a great summer for athletics, with the World Championships and the Commonwealth games.

Since distance running is the only sport I was ever any good at, I particularly enjoy those races. But I also like to marvel at the apparent impossibility of the pole vault, and a person leaping nearly two and half metres from the ground.

There are the famous rivalries that add to the excitement; and the surprise winners, who look almost as shocked as the commentators to find themselves in the lead. But I think the thing I have noticed especially this summer is the way competitors in a particular event interact.

At the highest level, the same men and women compete in every major event; they get to know each other. More than anyone else they can empathise with the heartbreak of injury at the critical moment, and they are often the first to provide comfort. Best of all though, is the genuine delight with which they greet a new world record attained by a rival. Although these are individual sports, it's almost as if they are one team, competing *together* against injury, weather, and the physical challenge of getting it all together at the right time to run, jump or throw further than

ever before.

At a time when our media, and often our politicians too, seem intent on causing rifts and fostering divisions, this togetherness against a common foe has been refreshing. It has made me think how much better life might be if we saw the cost-of-living rises, the devastation caused by climate change, and the aftermath of covid as our common foe. Of course, we won't all agree on how best to tackle them – but we could at least be ready to listen and applaud when someone has a good idea – even if they are not, strictly speaking, part of 'our team'.

September sees a new class of children join our primary school. It will be lovely seeing them become part of the ASJ family where adults and children work together against any challenges that come their way.

This is also the feeling we hope to foster in our church community. In the family of Christ there should be no outsiders. It is a challenge following Jesus, but we try to face those challenges together, and celebrate together when things go well. We are a family of pilgrims of all ages, learning together what it is to follow Jesus and share his love with the world. Everyone is welcome, if you haven't already done so – why not join us?

Home Communion



For several months, I have been part of a team delivering home communion to a group of people who would have difficulty in getting to church. I regard it as a real privilege to be invited into their homes to share with them this sacred time of fellowship.

Their reasons for not getting to church are numerous: frailty, lack of transport, loss of independence, general health problems. By bringing holy communion to them, we are emphasising that the church is a reference to people, not a place, and we hope to leave them feeling less isolated and alone.

We have all been trained and we have learned some new vocabulary along the way. We go to church at the beginning of the month and open the *aumbry* and take out the consecrated wafers, which we put in our *pyxes*. The *aumbry* is like a little safe set in the wall of the chancel and the *pyx* is a small round container used to carry the consecrated wafers. Since our group is something new, our *pyxes*

are shiny new and we have been given a leather pouch to carry them in. We are all very proud to do so.

If you struggle to physically get to church, and would appreciate still sharing in the sacramental life of the parish, please get in touch with Alison.

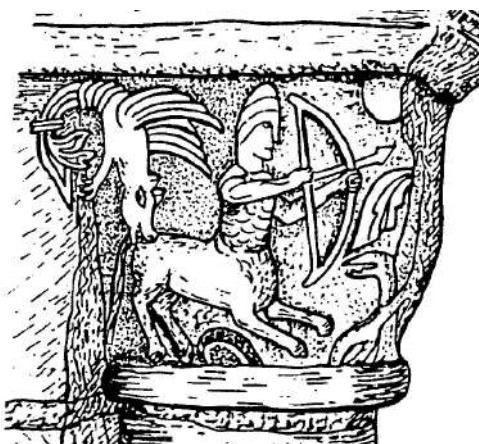

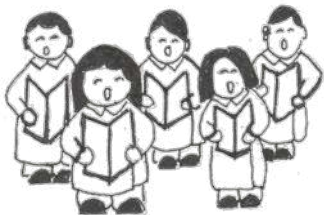

Environmental News

RED ALERT for global warming!

We are now into the Autumn months; things should be cooling down, with summer as a memory. Cast our minds back to July. The highest temperature ever recorded, broken several times a day in the UK. In Leeds we saw it reach the high 30s. July was also the driest month since 1935. It seems like every summer the temperature reaches new heights and could this be the pattern and effects of climate change?

Global warming isn't a new thing. It has been steadily rising since the industrial revolution as we harnessed the power of fossil fuels, increasing its pace. Greenhouse gases such as carbon dioxide and methane are released into the atmosphere and get trapped, acting as a blanket around our planet. As our population grows, so does the demand for energy with power stations still burning fossil fuels and releasing carbon dioxide into air.

What can we do to help? More on this in later editions of Adel Bells, but for now The Church of England is committed to reducing its carbon footprint, aiming to be net zero by 2030. One person can't do everything but little by little, we can all play a part to help God's creation.

Where are we now? On Friday 22nd of April, Earth Day 2016, the Paris Agreement was opened for countries to sign up to. The agreement was set up to try and bring the world's leaders together to act before it is too late, with the aim to reduce emissions of greenhouse gases and to keep the global mean temperature rise to below 2°C by the middle of the 21st century.



It's not too late to act – we have seen examples of positive climate action. In the 1970s scientists discovered that the CFCs found in aerosols including propellants, solvents, fridges, aircon units and insulation was depleting the ozone layer; letting harmful UV radiation through. This saw a rise in skin cancer and the world was quick to react. In 1987 the Montreal Protocol was introduced and signed by over 30 countries to phase out ozone depleting substances such as CFCs. More than 30 years later and the ban is still in place, helping to heal our planet for future generations.

In past years we have called upon the crafters of Adel to help us by knitting (or crocheting) angels, poppies, hearts and even rainbows. All these items have been well received and appreciated by our Adel community. Well, we have another suggestion for you.

At Adel Church it is always a real pleasure to receive children for baptism. During the pandemic there were difficulties in holding a service of baptism, but now things are getting back to normal.

A reminder to spend time with God

We came up with the idea of what we could offer the children for use following the service. And the idea of a prayer bear was born, a small bear which would be the child's companion as they said their prayers. It would serve as a reminder to spend time with God.

The bears will have a tag attached to them and it will say:

I am your little prayer bear
I'm here to help you pray.
Whether you're sad or happy,
Tell God about your day.
I'll be there to listen
And ask God to bless you today.



I have found two patterns, either of which can be used. If you would like to have a go at knitting one or two, please let me know and I will let you have a copy of the pattern.

The bear wearing a jumper (5" tall) needs to be knitted on double-pointed needles. The other one (6" tall) is just straight knitting and might be easier if you are not used to knitting in the round. If you are not happy with sewing the features on, you can always hand them to me and I can add them.

1152 Club meeting

10am Tuesday 26th August 2022

It was lovely to be back with Patrick Bourne at Kirkstall 1152 Club.

We enjoyed an illustrated talk on ***The Life & Works of Barbara Hepworth*** by **Angie Thompson, Youth Curator at Leeds City Art Gallery**. Quite a change for Angie to be talking to the over 55s, at Kirkstall!

Angie told us how Barbara was born in 1903. She was baptised at Wakefield Cathedral and attended Wakefield Girls High School, then trained in sculpture at Leeds School of Art.

Barbara, the eldest of four children used to accompany her father, a civil engineer and surveyor, on car journeys all over the West Riding of Yorkshire. Family holidays were at Robin Hood's Bay. Barbara loved the Yorkshire hills, crags, dales and coast - and this influenced her work. She won

a scholarship to London Royal College of Art and visited Paris with her friend, **Henry Moore**, and other students.

Barbara married fellow sculpture student **John Skeaping** in 1925. Their son Paul was born in 1929. Angie showed us family photos alongside pictures of Barbara's sculptures, including her 1934 Mother and Child with simplified, rounded features, and with the child as a separate part. Barbara and John divorced in 1931.

Later Barbara's work became more abstract under the influence of her second husband, artist **Ben Nicholson**. In 1939, the family (which now included triplets, born 1934), moved from London to Cornwall. She stayed at Trewyn (studio, home and ***Sculpture Garden***) and worked there until she died in **1975**.

Most of us at the Talk had seen Barbara's work, outdoors, at the ***Yorkshire Sculpture Park***. I had first experienced and been amazed by her ***Contrapuntal Forms*** at the **1951 Festival of Britain**.

Many thanks to Angie Thompson: she said Barbara wanted people to walk around her sculptures - not stand in one position as they would view a painting.

In Your Garden

"O sweet September rain!
I hear it fall upon the garden beds,
Freshening the blossoms which begin
to wane..."

Mortimer Collins, "Rain in September"

After a quite remarkable summer of extreme heat, sunshine and record low rainfall totals this could be an evocation, enchantment or a prayer!

This summer there has already been a lot of stress to our gardens and, depending on when we finally get some rain (none in the forecast at the time of writing), the harm will only increase. With water shortages and restrictions spreading across the country it is hard to be too optimistic about a speedy recovery in the garden. However, recover it most certainly will, in its own time. It might not be as luxuriant as you would hope this Autumn, flowering periods will be reduced and there are likely to be a few casualties in the borders. Some shrubs will lose leaves or whole stems. But most plants will recover as soon as they can access a secure source of water. Rejuvenation will vary from plant to plant but if we have normal rainfall levels over the winter green shoots should be visibly as usual next spring.

Lawns are often the most visible

reflections of drought, but also one of the most tolerant and resilient. They will return to their normal green selves with the next significant rainfall. Similarly, established trees and shrubs, whilst they may drop leaves earlier than usual, will also be just fine in time.

My water butts have staved off the worst effects in my garden. They ran dry in July during the first heatwave but filled up again in the short damp spell that followed. Although almost empty once again they have facilitated a targeted distribution of water where it is needed over a much longer period. The next rainfall will be welcome in the gardens but will also refill the water butts. If the subsequent rain is delayed there will be stores to deploy.

I also have a deep pond in my garden that, although with inevitably lower water levels than usual, still provides a cool moist atmosphere all around it from which the surrounding plants all benefit. It has also provided a boon for all the neighbourhood wildlife which has so little standing water left to drink or to bathe in.

St John Chrysostom

St John Chrysostom, a great saint of the Eastern Church, is commemorated in the Anglican calendar and his feast-day is celebrated on 13th September. A renowned preacher, his sermons are scholarly and vigorous in tone; he pulled no punches when tackling the challenging issues of the day! He quickly earned the nickname of 'Chrysostomos', meaning 'golden mouthed'. He wrote several treatises, amongst which the book of Instructions to Catechumens, which has a lasting influence on the catechism of the western church. The Orthodox and Eastern Catholic Churches of the Byzantine Rite use 'The Divine Liturgy of St John Chrysostom' as the normal Eucharistic liturgy and the belief that he was the author gives this liturgy a special status and recognises his undoubted influence as a liturgist.

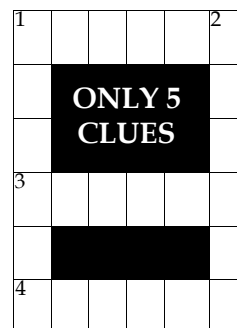
It was this liturgy that Thomas Cranmer drew upon when he composed the Litany, as published in the original Book of Common Prayer of 1549. This Litany included a prayer believed to be by St John Chrysostom and, in the 1662 BCP this prayer was printed as a possible concluding prayer for Matins and Evensong. It is the prayer that has in it the phrase 'that when two or three are gathered together in thy name, thou wilt grant

their request'. Whether it really was written by him, we will never know, but it is rubricated in the BCP and in Common Worship as 'A Prayer of St Chrysostom'. I like the fact that, thanks to Cranmer, the Anglican tradition also has a slender liturgical connection with him.

Born c. 347, educated first in the law and then in theology at the great centre of learning in Antioch. he felt called to the monastic life and for a time lived as a hermit, when he began the extreme asceticism which permanently undermined his health. He was ordained deacon in 381 and priest in 386, and devoted special attention to preaching. For twelve years he preached sermons on many biblical books, earning himself a reputation as an outstanding biblical interpreter and moralist. Against his wishes, in 398 he was made Patriarch of Constantinople and determinedly set about reform, presenting uncompromising moral challenges to other senior ecclesiastics and to the Empress Eudoxia.

The enemies he made brought about his ruin. Following a packed trial, in 404 he was removed from his see. When this did not silence him, he was banished, first to Antioch and then to Pontus on the Black Sea. He was finally deliberately killed by enforced travelling on foot in bad weather.

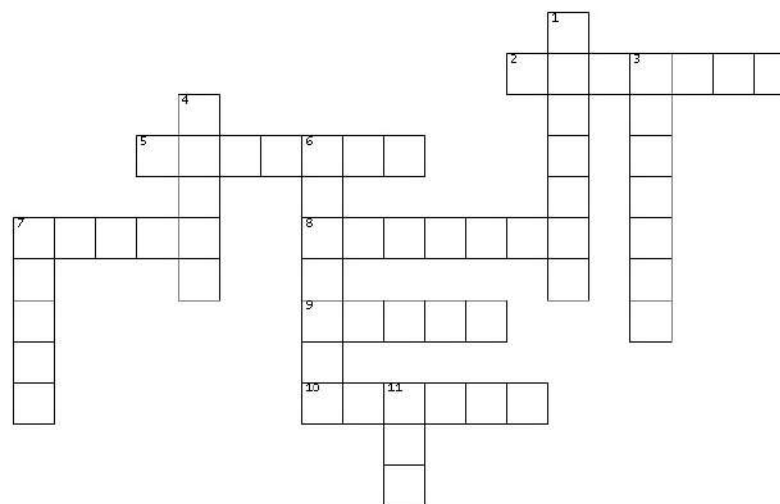

York Gate Update

In this year of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee marking 70 years of her reign, years which have seen many changes not least in gardening, I noticed that we too have been looking back over the 70-year history of the garden at York Gate.

Fred and Sybil Spencer bought York Gate in September 1951 but it wasn't until the following February after conversion work had been completed that they moved into the house. In his diary Fred Spencer noted "The King died last week. The nation is very deeply touched and most of us are wearing black ties. We had not had so young a sovereign as Elizabeth since Victoria came to the throne."

York Gate at that time was a smallholding with a farmyard and outbuildings, a couple of fields and an orchard waist high in brambles and nettles. Here they were not only able to keep their horses, Emperor and Duchess, but as rationing was still in place after the war, they had pigs, ducks and hens and grew their own fruit and vegetables.

However, Sybil also loved plants and gardening and in 1953 they planted 300 beech trees as boundary hedging and began to create their garden. In 1954 the pond in the orchard was constructed and in 1957 their son Robin started to create the Dell. By the end of the 1950s the garden had

become their prime area of interest and pleasure and the adjoining farmyard and buildings were sold to a builder. Interestingly, 60 years later, York Gate Cottage is now a part of York Gate once again!

A garden never stands still

There is an old adage that "a garden is never finished" and although many have considered York Gate Garden was as near perfection as it could be, a garden never stands still. The gardeners continue to develop the garden with their own imprint, adding new features and enhancing the planting whilst ensuring that the essence of the garden remains.

One of the recent changes in the garden has caused quite a stir and been the subject of much discussion. In 2020 the life time collection of exotic plants belonging to a local gardener found a new home in Sybil's Garden at York Gate. Sybil was a great plantswoman and collector herself and she would have understood and appreciated the desire to see his wonderful collection preserved. She always loved to share her garden with people and who knows what changes she would have embraced.

The new exotic plants in Sybil's Garden are looking lush and green and quite dramatic now and will be at their best in September --- what do you think?

Dyneley Arms Junction Upgrade

Plans have been in place for some months to upgrade the Dyneley Arms junction and this work is now to commence on 12th September. Inspections and surveys will be included to ensure a safe working environment. To improve safety and reduce delays, we will be upgrading the existing signalised junction with a 'smart' signalling system, including introducing crossing facilities outside the Dyneley Arms on both the A660 and the A658. There will also be carriageway widening on the A658 to realign the dedicated left turn lane on to the A660. Dedicated right turn lanes will also be provided on all arms of the junction. To complete the project new tarmac will be laid. Works at this location will take approximately six months to complete.

Woodland Creation Latest Site

The latest site locally for the Council's Woodland Creation project is Sir George Martin Drive: 3 standard trees approx. 6-8 feet over the next couple of years, on the island by the bottle banks.

Reporting Crime

I have discussed with the new policing team on how residents can report issues to the police more easily. Their preferred option is through the

website. www.westyorkshire.police.uk/report-it If a crime is in process of being committed or in an emergency, you must always call 999.

Phishing Attacks – Action Fraud

Action Fraud has issued some helpful advice on phishing attacks. Criminals impersonate trusted organisations by creating legitimate-looking messages and websites in order to trick people into opening the doors to their personal information. Once criminals have this information, it can be used to perpetrate fraud and cyber against you, or in your name. As of 31st May 2022, the National Cyber Security Centre's Suspicious Email Reporting Service (SERS) has received over 12mn reports from the public and has removed over 83,000 scams and 153,000 malicious websites. The most impersonated organisations in phishing emails reported last year were the NHS, HMRC and GOV.UK. Most phone providers are part of a scheme that allows customers to report suspicious text messages for free by forwarding it to **7726**. When a text is reported to **7726**, the provider can investigate the origin of the text and arrange to block or ban the sender, if it's found to be malicious. As of May 2022, 13,000 scams have been removed as a result of people reporting using the 7726 service.

Most of the phishing scams reported start with an unexpected email or text message. Whether it's an email asking you to "verify" your bank account details, or a text message claiming you've been in close contact with someone that's got COVID, the goal of a phishing attack is usually the same - to trick you into revealing personal and financial information.

If you have any doubts about a message, contact the organisation directly. **Don't** use the numbers or address in the message – use the details from their official website. Remember, your bank (or any other official source) will never ask you to supply personal information via email. If you think an email could be a scam,

you can report it by forwarding the email to: report@phishing.gov.uk. Send us emails that feel suspicious, even if you're not certain they're a scam - we can check.

If you've lost money or provided personal information as a result of a phishing scam, notify your bank immediately and report it to Action Fraud: www.actionfraud.police.uk For more advice on how to protect yourself online, visit: cyberaware.gov.uk

Woodland Creation

A small site on Sir George Martin Drive has been added to the Woodland Creation project. The trees will be planted on the small green area at the junction of East Moor Lane and Sir George Martin Drive where the number 28 turns around to reverse its route. Public Footpath 17

I've had a number of complaints about the possible change of use of the path, not just about the temporary closure. The path follows the route of an ancient Corpse Way and was used by families to carry their loved ones to

the church for burial. These routes have evolved over the centuries into the public footpaths of today. The plans to slightly alter the route and triple the width of this path have caused concern in Adel and elsewhere, not least because it will include future provision for cyclists. I have been advised that the route will remain a footpath and that use by cyclists will be by permission of the landowner only, but this sounds very much like the thin end of a very thick wedge. Progress!!! As is always the case where enforcement is appropriate it is generally noticeable by its absence. If you have any questions about the path please contact me or you can get in touch with council footpath officers direct by emailing PROW@leeds.gov.uk

Roadworks

You will be delighted to learn that the end is in sight of the seemingly never ending works adjacent to the Lawnswood Arms which entailed the blocking off of the junction of Kingsley Drive with Otley Rd for months. A combination of poor underground mapping of current cabling and pipework and restricted working hours for safety reasons meant that the work has dragged on till late Summer. I am told that the works should be finished by 1 September, so fingers crossed. However, as one door closes another slams in your face. Yet another "upgrading" of the Dyneley Arms junction is due to start on 5 September with a planned finish date in

December this year but you won't be surprised to learn that there may be some slippage till January. The works involved new "smart" signals, pedestrian crossings and widening of the carriageway on the Harrogate/Bradford A658 section to facilitate safer right and left turns on to the A660.

Parish Council for Adel

I have been approached by several groups of residents interested in setting up a non-political parish council in Adel. This is not a simple task and requires considerable consultation with and the approval of residents. The benefits of parish councils include bringing democracy much closer to the people in Adel, enabling the local community to have a greater influence on issues that affect everyone, providing improved services and ensuring better representation and support for local community and voluntary organisations. If you are interested in the idea please let me know your views. Everyone is entitled to an opinion on this.
